Choosing the right boarding facility for your dog

Do you need to board your dog for the holidays? If so, you'll want to ensure the facility you choose offers quality care. Here are the criteria you should look at.

◆ The condition of the place. A good boarding facility should be clean, odor-free and relatively calm. Dogs should look content and stress-free. They should also have proper bedding and water.

• The amount of space provided. Find out whether the animals are kept in cages or large enclosed areas. You want your dog to be able to move around with ease.

◆ The activities offered. Ask about the daily routine, including the number of walks and opportunities for your dog to socialize and play.

♦ The food served. Some facilities ask you to bring food while others supply it. If it's the latter, make sure the food doesn't differ too much from what your dog usually eats.

♦ The emergency protocols in place. Find out how employees are trained to deal with injuries, illnesses and other urgent situations.

• The staff's training. Observe



how employees interact with various dogs when you visit the facility. They should also know how to recognize problematic situations before they deteriorate.

◆ The behavioral techniques used. Ask the staff about the methods they use to manage stress, discourage aggression and keep dogs in line at the facility.

◆ The permits. Depending on the number of dogs they board, the facility might require special certification from the government.

The best way to learn about a particular boarding facility is to arrange a tour. However, make sure you reserve a place sooner rather than later. Availability can be limited, especially around the holidays, and your dog may need to be vaccinated beforehand.

Bundling up your best friend

Winter weather dog worries

plenty of time outdoors in order to get enough exercise, enjoy the fresh air, stimulate their senses and do their business. However, when the temperature drops, you may wonder if it's safe for your pup to be out in the frigid air.

It's important to note that, like humans, dogs can suffer from hypothermia. In fact, their ears, nose, tail and foot pads are susceptible to frostbite. Therefore, it's advisable to keep your pup's outings brief if the temperature drops well below freezing.

All dogs need to spend dog for a walk in the winter, you must make sure your canine companion is prepared for the weather. There are several factors that influence whether or not your dog should wear a winter coat and boots. You should consider:

> ♦ The temperature (is the cold tolerable or piercing?)

♦ The duration of the walk (will you be out for five minutes or an hour?)

♦ The planned activity (are you going for a hike or When you do take your stroll around the block?)

♦ Your dog's breed (short-haired and shortlegged dogs tend to get colder faster)

♦ Your pet's age (puppies and older dogs are more vulnerable to cold weather)

♦ Your dog's health (sick, injured or recovering pets should stay inside to keep warm)

If your dog needs to be bundled up for winter walks, visit a local pet shop to find boots and a quality coat that will keep them warm all season.

5 fish for your first aquarium

If you want to set up your first aquarium, you might be wondering which species to adopt. Here are five colorful suggestions that are great for beginners:

Cape Lopez Iyretail



These speckled orange fish live in pairs, and a small aquarium with plenty of plants to hide among will suit them well. Just make sure the tank has a lid because they love to jump.

Zebrafish



Also known as danio rerio, this is a robust species that lives in schools. Although they're content in room temperature water, zebrafish require a tank volume of at least 52 gallons.

Betta



These fish come in a variety of colors and can thrive in a modest-sized bowl with warm water. Also known as Siamese fighting fish, you should only have one of this species in an aquarium.

Cardinal tetra



These active and vibrant fish can live peacefully in a community aquarium. In fact, it's recommended to have at least 10 of this schooling species in a tank.

Commonly called rainbow fish because of their colorful scales, this species is easy to care for and reproduces quickly. To avoid aggressive behavior, a ratio of three females per male is recommended.



Going GREEN

Native to the forests and woodlands of South America, the green-cheeked conure has many attributes that make it a wonderful companion.

1. They're small

Adult green-cheeked conures are only about 10 inches long, but these small birds have the personality of a big parrot.

2. They're intelligent

These curious birds are fast learners and easy to train. While they're not big talkers, you can teach your conure to step up, somersault, wave, roll over and much more.

3. They're playful

Known for their acrobatics, conures love to climb, swing and flip. Keep in mind that these make great pets

outgoing birds need at least two to four hours of exercise outside their cage every day.

4. They're affectionate

Green-cheeked conures thrive on human interaction and love spending time with their owners. They enjoy being pet and might even snuggle up against your neck or cheek.

While they do chirp, the green-cheeked conure doesn't chatter nearly as loud or as frequently as other parrot species.


