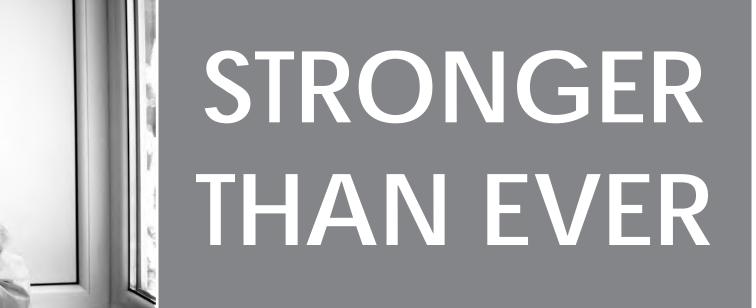

Nurses bonds unbreakable amidst pandemic

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At a time when hospitals are shutting student nurses out of their programs during a major pandemic, and some nursing schools are turning away applicants because of that, a partnership between Guthrie Cortland Medical Center and Tompkins Cortland Community College is helping expand enrollment.

The nursing program at Tompkins County Community College saw more applications this year than in previous years, said Kim Sharpe, department chairwoman of the nursing program at the Dryden college. The college accepts 85 students a year, but received close to 400 applications.

"Bonding together and relying on each other, we've really learned to trust each other and to know that we have each other's back more than ever," said Amy Simmonds, a nurse leader at the hospital in Cortland. "We'd had to work together and build teamwork not just in nursing but globally."

Guthrie Cortland Medical Center works with TC3 to get student nurses into the hospital for clinicals — supervised interactions with patients in healthcare facilities — Sharpe said. During the pandemic, the hospital stopped allowing students into their facilities in anticipation of an influx of patients. In August, students were invited back, Sharpe said.

"They've been dealing with so many of their own issues and they've really gone out of their way to help us keep the education for students on track and I think they recognize our students are their future nurses," Sharpe said. "It's in their best interest to do that but it's really admirable to do that when dealing with crises on a daily basis."

The American Association of Colleges of Nursing reported in April that enrollment in bachelor's, master's, and doctoral nursing programs increased in 2020 despite concerns the pandemic might diminish interest. Enrollment in bachelor's degree programs was up 5.6% to more than 250,000 students.

However, the association reported, citing an annual survey of 956 of the nation's 1,035 nursing schools with bachelor's or more advanced programs, thousands of qualified applicants are turned away from four-year programs — more than 80,500 nursing candidates in 2020 — because of a shortage of clinical sites like Guthrie Cortland Medical Center.

Simmonds, a graduate of TC3, said she has a strong working relationship with the nurses and professors at the college. She advocated for the students' education early on, stating students need to be taking care of patients.

"The simulations and virtual classes have some benefits, but nothing can replace that relationship that the students need to physically take care of the



patients," Simmonds said. "They have open use of our skills lab and can use the equipment and the supplies in there."

The pandemic changed nursing, and education, daily, said Simmonds. But Guthrie, and TC3, have not lost students, or nurses.

"These nurses will look back and think that it was a really hard time emotionally, but they would not change a thing," Simmonds said. "I wouldn't either."

However, patients relying on nurses for comfort and assistance has been the biggest change, Sharpe said. Nurses must work harder to provide connection to patients and it will make her students better nurses because of it.

"Adapting to change and being flexible is a skill they're going to come out of this with," said Sharpe, who also works in hospice care. "Sometimes being the absolute only person that's there for that patient is something that I haven't seen happen much in my career except during the pandemic."

Awards and recognitions for nurses

♦ Distinguished Direct Patient Care Award: This award recognizes a registered nurse who provides exemplary direct patient care. He or she must also contribute to the advancement of the nursing practice by demonstrating a commitment to personal leadership.

♦ The DAISY Award: The DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nurses recognizes the work nurses do every day. The award was established by the DAISY Foundation, which focuses on eliminating diseases that attack the immune system (DAISY). A DAISY Award is presented monthly to nurses in hospitals across America.

♦ The Grace Award: This award recognizes outstanding achievements and dedication in caring for expectant mothers and children.

◆ Public Health Service Award: This award honors nurses who are outstanding professionals and contribute to public health nursing.

♦ Jeanne Mance Award: This award is the highest recognition for nursing achievement that the Canadian Nurses Association offers. It is named after one of the country's most inspirational nurses, and has been issued at the CNA biennial convention since 1971.

• **Diversity Award**: This award recognizes registered nurses who have a long-standing commitment and have made significant contributions to the advancement of diversity in the nursing profession.

◆ The Beacon Award for Excellence: This award honors nursing units that distinguish themselves by improving multiple facets of patient care. Recipients set the standard for excellence in patient care and use evidence-based information to provide positive patient outcomes.

◆ Excellence in Leadership Award: Established to honor a person whose primary responsibility is to manage people or projects, this award is given to those who excel in leadership, teamwork, communication, accountability, and more.

♦ The Award of Excellence in Nursing: Presented each year during National Nursing Week, this award is given to nurses who were nominated by their peers. This award celebrates the dedication, initiative and excellence of nurses employed by Canadian First Nations communities and Indigenous Services Canada and Inuit communities.

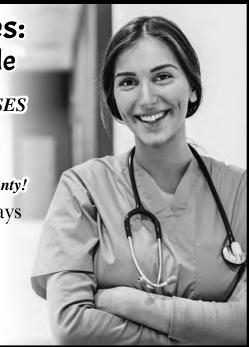

The important role of nursing assistants

Health professionals are often unsung heroes. However, since the arrival of COVID-19, millions of people have had their eyes opened to the crucial role medical providers play in regard to helping patients and their families.

Nursing assistants are tireless health care workers who perform their tasks with professionalism and patience. Certified nursing assistants, or CNAs, help patients with their basic daily care, and may assist with:

Making beds and changing bedding.

Helping patients use toilets and tending to catheters.

 Helping patients to get dressed.

Monitoring vital signs and reporting on patients' health.

Handling feeding and helping the patient drink.

CNAs work in various settings, notably long-term care facilities, doctors' offices, hospitals, Turning bedridden patients and rehabilitation clinics. Nursing assistants often are the first responders when a patient calls for help. They traditionally work under the guidance of registered nurses, and the work of CNAs

frees up nurses to provide care that requires a greater level of training, such as administering IV medication or alerting doctors to significant changes in health.

Nursing assistants must possess certain qualities, as the job requires caregiving above all. The nursing resource All Nursing Schools says CNAs must be able to listen to patients' concerns and develop personal relationships. The care CNAs provide requires a certain level of intimacy, and CNAs must have demeanors that help patients feel comfortable. Some tasks may involve lifting or helping to move a patient, so some measure of physical strength also is needed. Most importantly, CNAs often provide companionship and friendship, especially in home care settings. Providing comfort for patients who are scared, lonely or upset also is part of a CNA's job.

Nursing assistants are important health care professionals and often part of a team of caregivers that help patients enjoy improved quality of life.

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Simple ways to thank local nurses

ber 2020.

That data is sobering and serves as a reminder that nurses put their lives on the line each day they go to work. Such sacrifices are worthy of widespread support, and there are many ways ordinary citizens can thank nurses working in their communities.

Nurses have made immeasurable sacrifices throughout the pandemic. Communities can come together in various and often simple ways to show nurses just how much those sacrifices are appreciated.

SUPPORT PPE FOR NURSES

Despite widespread recognition of how vital they are to public health, nurses still may not have unbridled access to personal protective equipment (PPE). An ANA survey of nurses working in various health care settings conducted in fall 2020 found that 42 percent of nurses indicated they were still experiencing widespread or intermittent PPE shortages. In fact, more than half of the 21,000-plus nurses surveyed reported that they were forced to re-use singleuse PPE, a practice they said makes them feel unsafe. The public can do its part by urging local lawmakers to support legislation that increases domestic production of PPE so the men and women in the nursing profession can feel safer when doing their jobs.

Local business owners can do their part by offering discounts to nurses and other health care professionals in their communities. A 10 percent discount on a restaurant bill or a nursing discount on a fresh bouquet of flowers can lift nurses' spirits and reassure them that their communities are behind them.

Before going to the grocery store, text or call a friend or neighbor in the nursing field to see if he or she needs anything from the store. If nurses shop online for their groceries, arrange to pick them up so nurses can spend more time relaxing at home with their families. During warm weather seasons, offer to mow the lawn or help with leaf pickup.

Long shifts in stressful situations have taken a toll on nurses and their families. Neighbors can pitch in by offering to cook and deliver meals or pay for takeout for nurses and their families. This simple gesture can provide a muchneeded break for nurses and their spouses who have been stretched thin during the pandemic, and it's a great way to remind nurses their heroic efforts are not going unnoticed.

Right now, our nurses and health care workers are on the front lines battling COVID-19 and the health needs of our community and beyond. Thank you for the sacrifices you have made and will continue to make. Your service is saving countless lives and making a difference.

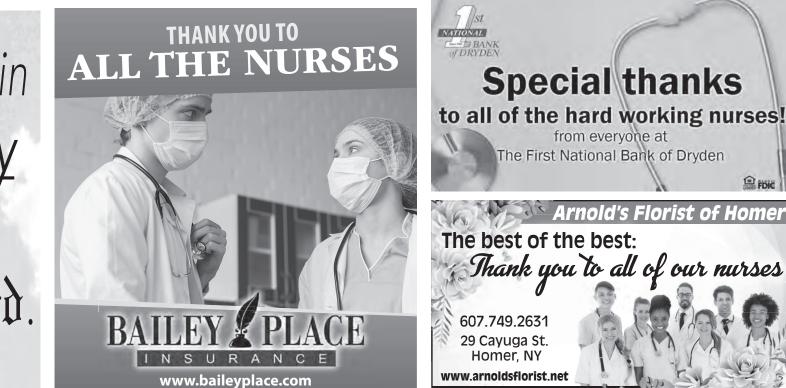

Prevention magazine says compression socks work to reduce fluid buildup and fatigue in the legs by promoting better blood flow in the veins of the calves and feet. Nurses should begin with lighter compression ratings, although a custom fit and prescription by a doctor is the best way to go about getting compression socks. ♦ Alternate footwear.

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Discounts for health care workers

Health care workers are heroes in the best of times, but the heroic efforts of our frontline medical workers has been especially notable since the outbreak of the COVID-19 virus. Since the winter of 2019-20, health care workers have put their lives on the line every day to treat the sick, including those infected with the deadly virus.

In recognition of the hard work and sacrifices made by health care workers, various businesses offer discounts exclusive to medical professionals who can confirm their employment or first responder status with valid identification cards. The following are just a few of the many retailers offering discounts to health care workers.

• Adidas: Adidas gives heroes 30 percent off, a discount that's available to medical professionals, first responders and nurses, among others.

• Asics: Medical professionals can receive 40 percent off all full-priced items in the Asics online store at www. asics.com.

• **Bose**: Doctors and nurses are among the various professionals who are eligible for discounts from the audio products retailer Bose. After verifying their eligibility with ID.me, health care workers can receive exclusive discounts on orders of \$199 or more at Bose.com.

• **HSN**: Nurses who shop at HSN.com are eligible for a 15 percent discount off a single-item purchase.

• Levi's: Though many people social distancing at home have stashed away their jeans in favor of sweatpants, Levi's[®] is offering a 25 percent discount on all of its apparel to medical professionals and first responders who can verify their eligibility.

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Qualities that help nurses thrive

Nursing is a challenging and rewarding field. Nurses are in high demand, and the COVID-19 pandemic has only highlighted just how vital these talented medical professionals are.

The American Association of Colleges of Nursing says nursing is the United States' largest health care profession, employing more than 3.8 million registered nurses. In 2018, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics estimated that registered nurse jobs are projected to grow by 15 percent between 2016 and 2026. The Canadian Institute for Health Information says that, as of 2019, there were 439,975 regulated nurses in Canada.

Many people interested in nursing careers may wonder if they have what it takes to be a nurse. Certain qualities can help nurses thrive in this challenging field.

■ Trustworthiness: For nearly two decades the American public has ranked nursing as its most trusted, admired and ethical profession, as indicated in Gallup polls. Nurses hold high ethical standards and 84 percent of respondents ranked nurses' honesty as "very high" or "high."

■ Empathy: Being able to feel what another person is experiencing from the patient's point of view is a skill nurses must hone. This may require nurses to put themselves in their patients' shoes and adapt care to make patients feel more comfortable and secure.

■ Emotional stability: Nurses often have to shelve their emotions so they can offer their patients the most effective care. Each day can bring powerful emotions. Nurses are not robots, but they have to perfect the balance of being empathetic while remaining strong in challenging situations. According to Daymar College, research has shown that nurses who are emotionally stable are more capable of solving problems and keeping their patients safe.

■ Effective communication: Great nurses are good communicators who can absorb information from their patients and communicate health care initiatives back succinctly. Nurses also must be able to effectively share information and care plans between doctors and other staff.

■ Problem-solving: Professional nurses see problems and find solutions. They know when certain situations may be challenging and seek the input of others to come to a satisfactory outcome.

■ Team player: Nurses need to work seemlessly with health care teams, patients, families, and all individuals involved in a health plan. This may require nurses to don many different hats while remaining flexible and being willing to adapt to changing situations on the fly.

Demand for nurses is surging and the profession can make for an exciting and rewarding career. Prospective nurses can take inventory of their personalities and skill sets to determine if nursing is the right fit.





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Specialist positions that are in demand

Critical care nurse: Critical care nurses are especially educated and trained for emergency situations. They are called on to tend to serious wounds and monitor life-support systems.

◆ Family nurse practitioner: An individual who becomes an FNP is trained in primary care health services for people of all ages. The duties of an FNP are similar to a primary care physician in diagnosing and treating illnesses, providing physical exams and prescribing medications.

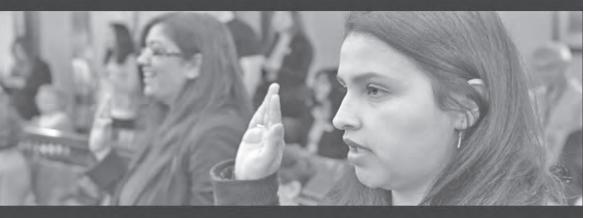
